Sanath Jayasuriya pleads with school cricketers...

'Be committed and disciplined'

ormer Sri Lanka cricket captain and 1996 World Cup champion Sanath Jayasuriya called on the next generation of budding players to be committed in what they do while adhering to discipline and the rules of fair-play if they are to succeed.

He made the remarks when he addressed winners of the 42nd Observer-SLT Mobitel School Cricket Awards held at the BMICH in Colombo last Tuesday as the chief guest.

"I myself won this award and I knew how important this was to me at that time when we did not even have the basic facilities. It is very different today where you have all the facilities and opportunities to realize your dreams of playing for Sri Lanka.

"So be committed make the most of what you have and pay attention to discipline. Without discipline you will not go far as a cricketer or sportsman,"

said Jayasuriya.

Recalling his school days Jayasuriya said he was only nine years old playing in the Under-II team at St. Servatius College at Matara and nothing stood in the way to discourage him despite the absence of facilities unlike in the present era.

"It is not going to be easy for anyone to be part of the Sri Lanka team. It will be a long and hard road ahead. When you leave school you will want to play for a club and that will be the next step and it will mean that you have competed in all the age groups at school and this is the best that your school can do for you.

"When I played for school it was not easy to enter the Sri Lanka team. But today I think it is different where you have more opportunities to be part of the Sri Lanka team which is not doing too well these days.

"Sri Lanka looks forward to players like you who will some day in the near future make the grade. In the past like until about 15 years ago we had schoolboy players who wore the Sri Lanka cap straight from school and I think some of you could be next. It is my only hope and wish to see players coming from all over the country able to make it to the Sri Lanka team," said Jayasuriya

Ranjan Madugalle

Roval College

Ranjan Madugalle is a former Sri Lankan cricketer and a former captain of the Sri Lankan team, who became a match referee in 1993. He was educated at Trinity College, Kandy and Royal College, Colombo.

Madugalle who showed early promise as a schoolboy at Royal College, became a top Sri Lanka cricketer. He was the first winner of the Observer Schoolboy Cricketer 1979 and went on to captain the Sri Lanka team and now occupies the prestigious seat of Chief Match Referee of the ICC.

Ranjan Madugalle who has been a popular figure at this competition (Observer Schoolboy Cricketer) won it in 1979 and said "it was one of the best things that happened to me in 1979 when I won the Observer Schoolboy Cricketer of the Year Award". He said playing for Royal brought him immense joy. "The school cricketers must be motivated and the outstation cricketers must not be neglected. This contest will give all encouragement to the school cricketers," he said.

He was one of the finest all rounders produced by Royal. Besides captaining Royal and then Sri Lanka under-19, he played a vital role against Pakistan to achieve success winning the 'Ali Bhutto Trophy' with his all round performances.



He presented Sri Lanka in international cricket between 1979 and 1988, making his debut in the 1979 ICC Trophy final against Canada. He had the honour of being in the first Sri Lankan Test team in 1982, and top-scored in the first innings with 65 – making a 99 runs partnership with Arjuna Ranatunga. Madugalle represented Sri Lanka in 21 Test matches and 63 one day Internationals and also captained the Sri Lankan cricket team in two Test matches.


 Captaincy record was 56 matches,12 wins,19 losses, 25 draws and the highest ODI batting score of 131 not out was made against India, Colombo, 1997. Arjuna Ranatunga is a former international cricketer and cricket administrator. He captained the Sri Lankan cricket team in the 1990s and led them in the 1996 Cricket World Cup victory. In the 2015 General elections he contested with the UNF for Good Gov-

ernance and was placed second in Gampaha District, and was appointed Minister of Ports and Shipping.

Arjuna along with his brothers (Dammika, Nishantha, Prasanna, Sanjeeva and Ruwan) he studied at Ananda College Colombo where his mother was a teacher and where he started playing cricket. He represented his school in both junior and senior teams.

A specialist left-handed batsman and parttime medium pace bowler, Ranatunga's career with the Sri Lankan national team began in 1982, when Sri Lanka were relative new-comers to international cricket and was a key player in the team. Under Ranatunga's captaincy, Sri Lanka started to improve rapidly. Their growing success rate culminated with a dominating performance and triumphed in the 1996 Cricket World Cup.

Ranatunga is also remembered for his stand in a One Day International against England. Australian Umpire Ross Emerson called Muttiah Muralidaran for throwing and Ranatunga exchanged heated words with umpire Emerson and led his team to a point just



inside the boundary line, halting play and giving the impression that he was about to forfeit the match, until the Sri Lankan management conferred with him and play resumed.

In June 2000, Ranatunga played in Sri Lanka's 100th Test match, becoming the only player to represent his country in their first and hundredth Tests.

Ranatunga's highest Test batting score of 135 not out was made against Pakistan, Colombo,1985-1986.

Captaincy record was 56 matches,12 wins,19 losses, 25 draws and the highest ODI batting score of 131 not out was made against India, Colombo, 1997.

Ranatunga's best bowling figures of 4 for 14 came against India at Kanpur in 1986-1987.






Roshan Mahanama is a former Sri Lankan cricketer and former ICC match referee. He was a key member in the 1996 Cricket World Cup wining team for Sri Lanka. He is the first man to stand as a match referee in a day-night Test match in history.

The high point of his school career was his splendid unbeaten knock of 145 runs in the 'Big Match' against Ananda which established a record when he captained the team in 1984.

With such wonderful promise that he held out as a schoolboy at Nalanda College, it was no surprise that he would climb the ladder of success – and climb he did in inter-school cricket

seasons and it was no surprise that the judges in the Observer Schoolboy Cricketer of the Year Contests picked him as Schoolboy Cricketer of the Year for two years in succession in 1983 and 1984.

A dashing right-hand batsman and brilliant fielder Roshan Mahanama is best remembered as a cricketer for his world record second wicket partnership of 576 with Sanath Jayasuriya in



a Test Match against India at the R. Premadasa Stadium in 1997, since surpassed by Kumar Sangakkara and Mahela Jayawardene in 2006.

Mahanama's contribution to that partnership was 225, the, highest score of his career. He was a key member of Sri Lanka's World Cup wining side of 1996. Roshan Mahanama established himself as a stylish opening batsman in the late 1980s and early 1990s under

the captaincy of Aravinda de Silva.

In the 1992 Cricket World Cup, Roshan Mahanama was selected as opening batsman along with M.A.R. Samarasekera and U.C. Hathurusinha, scoring 59 runs off 89 balls vs Zimbabwe, 80 runs off 131 balls vs New Zealand and 68 runs off 121 balls vs South Africa.

Following his retirement from international cricket in 1999, Roshan Mahanama made the transition into becoming an International Cricket Council match referee.

He made his debut as a match referee in the ODI between West Indies and Bangladesh in Kingstown 2004.


Asanka Gurusinha is a former Sri Lankan cricketer who enjoyed an 11-year international career, playing 41 Tests and 147 One Day Internationals for Sri Lanka. He was a specialist batsman who helped win the 1996 World Cup final with 65 in a partnership of 125 with the final's Man of the Match, Aravinda de Silva. He studied at Isipathana College, Colombo and then joined Nalanda College Colombo. He now lives in Melbourne, Australia.

Gurusinha was selected as the Sunday Observer Schoolboy Cricketer of the Year 1985, the year he captained Nalanda College.

At the tail-end of his school cricket career, Gurusinha, went further to stamp his class as a future Test prospect when he scored an unbeaten century in the 56th Ananda-Nalanda 'Big' cricket encounter and immediately followed it up by scoring a century for a Board President's XI against a touring Indian team captained by Kapil Dev.


Gurusinha played in 41 Test matches and 147 ODIs and was the 32nd Test 'cap' for his country. His has seven Test hundreds and eight Test 50s. He has scored centuries against Pakistan (1), New Zealand (3), Australia (2) and Zimbabwe (1). Against Pakistan, Gurusinha batted at number three and gradually cemented his place. Being a strongly built left-hander Gurusinha provided the much needed solidarity in the side's batting.

Gurusinha now domiciled in Australia brought



back nostalgic memories, saying that the Sunday Observer/Mobitel Schoolboy Cricketer of the Year contest during his time was a highly competitive one with highly talented schoolboys in many schools vying for honours.

Gurusinha was called up at 19 as a wicket-keeper, a role he took in a further two ODIs and one Test and was one of the main pillars of Sri Lanka's 1996 World



Cup winning batting line up. His application at the crisis situations to drag the team through was a major highlight for those who watched the World Series tournament back in 1996.



Making his known debut for the Sri Lankan Young Cricketers side, he went on to captain the team on seven occasions during the 1987/88 Youth World Cup, winning three matches. He played domestic cricket professionally for NCC at both First-class and List A level. He played primarily as a bowler with a good bowling average in the low 20s.

He umpired his first international match in 2009, overseeing the one-day International between India and Sri Lanka at the International Stadium in Dambulla and remains the youngest ever Sri Lankan to umpire any international match. He umpired at the 2011 Cricket World Cup and was appointed to the Elite Panel of ICC Umpires later that year. Dharmasena was named the Umpire of the Year at the 2012 ICC Awards, for which he received the David Shepherd Trophy.

Marvan Atapattu (born 22 November 1970 in Kalutara) is a former Sri Lankan cricketer and former Sri Lankan captain. He has coached Canada and Singapore national cricket teams previously. From April 2014 to September 2015, he was the Head Coach of the Sri Lankan team.

Marvan Atapattu started his cricket career as a teenager at Mahinda College, Galle. Then crossed over to Ananda College, Colombo, where he was subsequently coached by P.W. Perera.

Atapattu first came to the limelight winning the prestigious Sunday Observer Cricketer of the Year title in 1990. Since then, he went great guns, captaining SSC and Sri Lanka team with distinction.

He was the batting coach of the Sri Lanka national team and graced the 34th Observer-Mobitel Schoolboy Cricketer mega show as the chief guest on September 11, 2012.

Making his Test debut in November 1990 just after his 20th birthday, his first six innings yielded five ducks and a single run, but supporters insist that his debut-innings duck puts him in good company with batsmen such as Mike Atherton, Graham Gooch, Saeed Anwar and Wasim Akram, who all made debut-innings ducks and went on to score at least 2500 Test runs.

He made his one-day International debut against India at Nagpur. He was appointed as captain of the one-day team on April 2003. In April 2011 after the World Cup, Atapattu was named as the batting coach of the Sri Lankan national team. Following Paul Farbrace's early unexpected exit in 2014, he was appointed as interim head coach of the team. During this period, Sri Lanka won its first Test series in England in 16

years, with a 1-0 win in its 2014 tour. He officially took over as Head Coach in September 2014 and was the team's first local coach in 15 years.



He registered his highest Test score of 249 against Zimbabwe in 2004, sharing a 438 run partnership with Kumar Sangakkara for the second wicket.



Muttiah Muralidaran (born 17 April 1972) is a former Sri Lankan cricketer who was rated the greatest Test match bowler ever by Wisden Cricketers' Alamanack in 2002. He retired from Test cricket in 2010, registering his 800th and final wicket on 22 July 2010 from his final ball in his last Test match. Muralidaran holds the world record for the most wickets in both Test and one-day cricket. Muralidaran is the first wrist-spinning off-spinner in the history of the game and after his many attractive feats with the ball during the inter-school cricket seasons for St.Anthony's College, Katugastota he was picked Observer Schoolboy Cricketer of the Year in 1991. He was also picked as the Best Bowler too, that year.

Sajith Fernando was born on September 27, 1972, Kandy and he became the second Observer Schoolboy Cricketer (1992) from Kandy. Sajith started his cricketing career at St, Paul's College, Kandy (later Sri Sumangala College) where he was guided and made to play good cricket by former Sri Lanka cricketer D.H. de Silva.

In 1998, he was adjudged the man of the series in the premier limited over tournament when Colts emerged champions.

Apart from his domestic cricket career he has played for various clubs overseas in Australia, England and Bangladesh.

Mohamed Naveed Nawaz (born September 20, 1973 in Colombo), is a former Sri Lankan cricketer. He was a left-handed batsman and a leg-break bowler who played Test cricket and One-Day Internationals for Sri Lanka. During his school days he won the Observer Schoolboy Cricketer of the Year in 1993.

Nawaz retired from international and domestic cricket in 2005 and ventured into the field of coaching first-class cricket in Sri Lanka. In 2000. Sri Lanka Cricket appointed Nawaz the Head Coach of the Sri Lanka National under-19 team.

Thilan Samaraweera who became the tenth Anandian to represent Sri Lanka in Test Cricket, was twice winner of the Observer Schoolboy Cricketer of the Year award in 1994

and 1995 and on both occasions, he also won the best Batsman and Best all-rounder awards too. He was a prolific scorer in the 1984-1985 school cricket seasons. He topped 1,000 runs in both years with five centuries and an equal number of half centuries.

He actually started his career as an offspinner, He captured 72 wickets in the 1984 season and claimed 64 wickets in the 1985 school cricket season.

the tournament and was adjudicated ad the best batsman. On his return the selectors included him in the Sri Lankan Squad against New Zealander.










Batting style – Right-hand bat Bowling style – Right-arm off-break


